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### **COURSE DESCRIPTION (Goals & Objectives)**

This course interprets the critical events, developing institutions, and traditions of Israel. Attention is given to the earliest Covenants, to the Exodus, to the rise of the monarchy, and to other events up to the eighth century prophets.

After completing the course, students will be able to

1. Articulate a historical overview of the experience and faith of ancient Israel.
2. Exegete selected passages that illustrate crucial turning points in the history of Israel.
3. Apply exegesis to preaching, other pastoral responsibilities, and issues of the present day.

**WRITING ASSIGNMENTS**

**Papers are due at the beginning of the first class. Late assignments will be lowered one letter grade.**

**First Weekend:** September 21-23:

1. Read the Abraham stories in Genesis 12 - 24 and write a 2 page paper on the significance of the covenant with Abraham for the Christian church today.
2. Read Exodus 1- 20 and write a 2 page paper on the importance of the Exodus, the Passover and the Wilderness experience for the nation of Israel and the Christian church today.
3. Read Judges 1-3:6, 17-21, 1 Samuel 8-10 and write a 1-2 page paper on the differences between a theocracy and a monarchy.

**Second Weekend:** November 16-18:

1. Read 1 Samuel 3 and write a 2 page paper on the meaning of call in ancient Israel and today.
2. Exegete Exodus 34 and write a sermon on this passage. Hand in the written exegesis and sermon manuscript. If you prefer, the sermon can be also presented on video (DVD) or audio (CD) in addition to the manuscript.
